

# George Ackerman, MD Rotator Cuff Repair Post Operative Instructions

### **Pain Medication**

- A pain medication prescription has been sent to your pharmacy and can be used if needed.
- Tylenol (1000mg) and/or Advil (600mg) effective for control of mild to moderate pain.

#### Ice

- You may use ice to reduce swelling and discomfort. Apply for 20 mins per hour as needed.
- If you are using a cryotherapy machine, you may use it as directed (machine has a timer).

## **Dressing**

- Keep the dressing dry and remove bandage 48 hours after surgery.
- Place band-aids over the incisions after removing the dressing.

## **Showering**

- You may shower 48 hours after surgery.
- Please use caution! Be careful not to slip and fall. The effects of anesthesia and/or medication may make you drowsy or light-headed.
- Do not soak in a bathtub, hot tub, or pool until the sutures are removed.
- Once you are done showering, pat the incisions dry and apply band-aids.
- While in the shower you must keep the arm close to your body as if it were still in the sling.

## Sling

- Wear your sling at all times including sleeping and do not carry anything heavier than a phone.
- The sling is required for 3-4 weeks after surgery.

## **Physical Therapy**

- Physical therapy will not start until 2-4 weeks after surgery.
- Dr. Ackerman will provide you with a prescription at your first post-op visit.

#### **Follow-up Appointment**

- Please follow up with Dr. Ackerman 1 week after surgery.
- Call the office to set up the appointment if you do not already have one scheduled.

## **Common Concerns**

- Bruising and/or swelling of the shoulder, arm, and hand are common after surgery. To relieve this
  discomfort it is best to ice the shoulder.
- You should not drive until instructed by Dr. Ackerman. Generally this is 2-4 weeks after surgery.
- Many patients find sleeping more comfortable in a recliner, couch, or with several pillows.

## Please call if:

- · If have discomfort, swelling, or redness in the calf
- Any oozing or redness of the wound, fever (greater than 101.3° F), or chills
- · Any difficulty breathing or heaviness in the chest
